COVID-19 Vaccination Has Begun

Memorial Hospital received its first shipment of COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer on December 16, 2020. The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) worked with the Randolph County Health Department to distribute the first round of vaccines to the area. Randolph County Sheriff Department's Chief Deputy, Jarrod Peters, escorted Randolph County Health Department Public Health Administrator,

Angela Oathout, from the vaccine pick-up at Memorial Hospital, Belleville on December 16th and rushed the chilled vaccines to all three hospitals in Randolph County. They arrived at Memorial Hospital in Chester around 3:45pm and the first vaccine was administered to Dr. Barbara Ellzy, Memorial's ER Provider, at 4:30pm. Memorial Hospital's vaccination team began administering the doses to front-line workers who had voluntarily requested to receive it. Twenty-five providers, nurses, and hospital employees received their vaccinations that day, within an hour. Vaccinations for Memorial Hospital employees continued that Thursday and Friday. All persons at Memorial Hospital who wanted to be vaccinated, and were able, were administered their first dose. Additional vaccines were distributed throughout the community to other front-line healthcare workers and first responders. Those who received their first doses during the first round have since received their second.

As the vaccine supply increases in Randolph County, the priority populations in the community are being schedule to start receiving their vaccinations. As more information on vaccine availability for the public becomes available, the Health Department, hospitals, and clinics continue to update the community. At this time, Memorial Hospital, Red Bud Regional Hospital, and Sparta Community Hospital are working with the Randolph County Health (Continued on Page 2)








ANNUAL WELLNESS VISIT

What is preventive care and why do I need it?

Preventive care is what we do to prevent or delay medical problems. Getting preventive care saves you the time, money, and the worry that come with medical problems. And if you avoid medical problems, you'll be more independent and have a better quality of life for a longer time.

Why do I need a personalized plan?

Preventive care is not the same for everyone. What's best for you depends upon your medical history, your family's medical history, and how you live.

FOR EXAMPLE, for most people a colonoscopy is recommended every 10 years. If someone in your family has had colon cancer, you're at greater risk for colon cancer than most people. Having a colonoscopy more often than other people could save your life.

It's the same with many other conditions. Considering your history and your current situation helps us create an individualized plan for you.

Do I have to pay for this visit?

No. Medicare pays the entire cost of this visit if:

- You have had Medicare Part B coverage for more than 12 months, AND
- You have not had a Medicare Initial Preventive Physical Examination or an Annual Wellness Visit within the last 12 months.

If you're not sure if these are true for you, please ask.

I already go in for a routine physical checkup every year. Is this the same thing?

No. During your Annual Wellness Visit you'll make an overall plan for future visits. During your routine physical checkup (a separate visit), you can take some of the steps to carry out that plan.

The plan you make during your Annual Wellness Visit will help your routine checkups run more smoothly. As soon as you arrive at your routine checkup, your doctor can look at your plan and know what is the most important to do. This will give you more time in your routine checkup to talk about how you're feeling.

What will happen during the visit?


During your Annual Wellness Visit, we'll gather more information about your unique health situation. We'll discuss what medical problems you may need to watch out for, and how we can help prevent them. You may be given some preventive care, such as a flu immunization, but you will not be given an actual physical exam.

If I have other health concerns, can I ask about them during this visit?

If you have specific concerns about your health, you need to schedule another appointment.

What if my health situation changes in the future? Will my prevention plan change too?

Yes. Medicare will pay for you to come in every year and update your plan according to your current needs.



What should I bring to my planning visit?

When you come in for your Medicare Annual Wellness Visit, please bring the following:

immunization records.
Any family health history you have, in as much detail as possible.
A complete list of medications you take, including vitamins, supplements, and herbs. For each medication, write down how often and how much of each you take.
A list of healthcare providers and suppliers currently involved in your care.

REHABILITATION AND COVID-19 RECOVERY

A study, Role of Rehabilitation in Pandemics, published in the April 9, 2020 edition of the Journal of Rehabilitation Management, investigated the non-respiratory presentations and complications of a COVID-19 patient where medical rehabilitation may prove vital to a complete recovery. Specifically, the authors examined emerging reports from the most affected countries, as of March 31, including China, South Korea, Italy and Spain.

Data indicate that in addition to the most commonly attributed respiratory symptoms of this novel coronavirus, there are several clinical presentations that may be best addressed by medical rehabilitation. Several conditions

that have been reported in COVID-19 patients that would benefit from rehabilitative interventions include, but are not limited to, cerebrovascular disease and related strokes, seizures, skeletal muscular injuries and neuromuscular illnesses. While the COVID-19 pandemic is evolving on a daily basis, particularly in the United States, the study suggests that approximately

20% of recovering patients will require facility-based rehabilitative care. In order to best meet patient need and recovery, the study suggests that a fully integrated approach to care will render positive longer-term results.

- Evidence and key findings support that during disasters, early involvement of rehabilitation reduces disability and improves clinical outcomes.
- The rehabilitation needs of COVID-19 survivors will vary in different settings over time, but medical rehabilitation is essential in all phases of pandemic management.

- The study concludes, in part, that: "As in any disaster, the role of medical rehabilitation in pandemics is an integral component of comprehensive management."
- Another conclusion of the study: "Early rehabilitation of the COVID-19 patients can enhance pulmonary, respiratory function, reduce complications, improve function, cognitive impairments and quality of life."


Outpatient Therapy Services is an integral component in the treatment and the rehabilitation of patients with disability, disease or injury resulting in functional limitations or loss. We provide

items on the headwall and footwall, including new smart TVs, new patient recliners and visitor seating. Every room on the Medical Surgical Unit has a large, private bathroom that includes a full, adjustable shower, sink and facility that has seamless wall to floor coverage with a beautiful, slip-resistant epoxy coating. All lighting is adjustable to provide optimal patient experience.

New features were incorporated into each room with the patient comfort and safety in mind. All patient beds have built in features including stand assistance, verbal cues for fall risk patients, safety lights and advanced controls. Smart TVs in each room include pillow speaker interface and the latest technology. The call system has been upgraded to include direct call buttons for specific items like medication, restroom assistance, and are sent directly to the caregiver responsible. An overhead ceiling lift, implemented as part of the Safe Patient Handling Program, has been installed to help achieve an even safer lifting environment for patients, reducing the risk of patient injury from transfers and movement, and reducing risk of injuries to staff.

The improvements continue for our visitors throughout the newly remodeled Unit as well. Family and visitors are just as important as our patients are in the overall plan of care. New sleeper sofas are available in the private rooms and have multiple comfort zones, including recline and sleep position, a table for belongings and a USB port to plug in your communication devices. Visitors who need to step out of the patient room for a moment can have a seat in the alcove visitor seating designed along the hallway.

Memorial Hospital continues to "Build for your future needs." As a Joint Commission Accredited and 5-Star HCHAPS patient rated hospital these improvements help Memorial continue its efforts in providing the best quality healthcare for the community. As healthcare needs change and technology advances, Memorial continues to improve the critical access of care provided to Randolph County and the surrounding area.

MEDICAL SURGICAL UNIT IS NOW OPEN

Memorial Hospital's new Medical-Surgical and Intensive Care Units are now open. The new units are located on the south wing, upper level of the hospital that once housed other inpatient units, including the nursery, many years ago. "We are extremely grateful for the design and construction of our new Medical Surgical Unit," stated Brett Bollmann, Memorial Hospital CEO. "The primary goal of the New Med-Surg project was to improve patient safety, comfort, and work flow for our staff. We anticipate that the added enhancements will greatly improve the customer experience along with the continued exceptional medical care."

"The new unit offers a relaxed atmosphere that helps decrease anxiety and promote healing upon entering the unit," informed, Susan Diddlebock, Chief Nursing Officer. "Between the colors of the walls, the architectural ceiling and lighting and the sound reduction flooring and insulation, patients will notice the difference from our prior units."

The main hall has multiple workstations to improve staff workflows. The Medical Surgical Unit rooms are a mixture of seven private and eight semi-private rooms, each with a window view overlooking the forested area at the side and rear of the facility. Each patient space has built in cabinetry for patient

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Memorial Hospital Recognized for 5-Star Rating & Top Performance



During a virtual ceremony held November 17th, the Illinois Critical Access Hospital Network (ICAHN) recognized Memorial Hospital of Chester for its ongoing commitment to exceptional quality of care. ICAHN, located in Princeton, IL, is a network of 57 small rural Illinois hospitals dedicated to strengthening the operations of its member hospitals through collaboration.

As part of the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy Medicare Beneficiary Quality Improvement Program (MBQIP), Memorial Hospital and other critical access hospitals are asked to participate in four defined domains of quality outcomes, which includes: Patient Safety/Inpatient; Patient Engagement; Care Transitions; and Outpatient Measures.

Memorial Hospital's Environment of Care and Patient Safety Committees meet monthly to work on maintaining and executing top performance in the four domains of quality outcomes laid out by MBQIP. Directors and managers representing departments throughout the hospital and rural health clinics hold active roles on these committees. Each month members review areas that need attention and provide input for improvement. Employees are encouraged to consult their immediate supervisor with questions regarding employee or patient safety. This makes safety and quality of care everyone's responsibility at Memorial Hospital. Ideas and suggestions for improving safety programs are always welcome. "It takes a team effort from all departments to ensure service excellence," stated Hospital CEO Brett Bollmann. "We have worked



hard over the past few years to improve the patient experience and have plans for more improvements as we move forward!" Safety programs, equipment, and articles are shared with hospital staff quarterly through the Committees' "Safety Matters" newsletter.

Memorial Hospital was honored for being a top performer in all four domains and also for gaining a '5-Star' rating in HCAHPS (Hospital Consumer Assessment of Health Plans Survey) scores. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) created the HCAHPS Star Ratings to allow consumers to more quickly and easily access the patient experience of care information on the Hospital Compare website.



V-Safe: After Vaccination Health Checker

V-safe is a smartphone-based tool that uses text messaging and web surveys to provide personalized health check-ins after you receive a COVID-19 vaccination. Through v-safe, you can quickly tell CDC if you have any side effects after getting the COVID-19 vaccine. Depending on your answers, someone from CDC may call to check on you. And v-safe will remind you to get your second COVID-19 vaccine dose if you need one. Your participation in CDC's v-safe makes a difference — it helps keep COVID-19 vaccines safe.

How can I participate? Once you get a COVID-19 vaccine, you can enroll in v-safe Sign up with your using your smartphone. Participation is voluntary and you can opt out at any time. You will receive text messages from v-safe around 2pm local time. To opt out, simply text "STOP" when v-safe sends you a text message. You can also start v-safe again by texting

to tell CDC about getting the COVID-19 vaccine. You'll also ge reminders if you need a second vaccine dose

Deb Mevert, OR Manager and RN, CNOR, CNWFA(E), has worked at Memorial for 6 years. Her favorite part about her job is,


"Being a spokesperson for the patient at one of their most venerable times. Operating room staff are the eyes and ears for our patients while they are sedated or asleep."

CDC Advises Patient and Their Families to Be Antibiotics Aware

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is advising patients and their families to use antibiotics only when necessary to further reduce antibiotic resistance, the spread of superbugs, and protect patients from side effects from antibiotics. During U.S. Antibiotic Awareness Week in November, and throughout the year, CDC promotes "Be Antibiotics Aware," an educational effort to raise awareness about the importance of safe antibiotic use.

The "Be Antibiotics Aware" initiative educates the public about when antibiotics are needed, when they are not, how to take antibiotics appropriately, and potential side effects of antibiotics. The CDC encourages patients and families to:

- Get the facts about antibiotics. Antibiotics do not work on viruses, such as those that cause colds, flu, bronchitis, or runny green. When antibiotics aren't needed, they won't help you, and the side effects could still cause harm.
- Ask your healthcare professional about the most appropriate treatment for you or your loved ones' illness. If antibiotics are not needed, ask about the best way to feel better while your body fights off the virus.
- If you need antibiotics, take them exactly as prescribed. Talk with your healthcare professional if you have any questions about your antibiotics.

- Talk with your healthcare professional if you develop any side effects, especially severe diarrhea, since that could be a Closnoses, even if the mucus is thick, yellow, or tridioides difficile (C. difficile or C. diff) infection, which needs to be treated imme-
 - Do your best to stay healthy and keep others healthy by cleaning hands by washing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or using a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol; covering your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze; staying home when sick; and getting recommended vaccines, such as the flu vaccine.






